

Mr. Hinckley sees that they have "stopped it up" with the addition of Mr. Weiss, and he noted, "I like him a lot. He's a great case manager. He's connected to everyone in town, restaurants and other places in the city. He sets up activities for me that we weren't doing before."

Mr. Hinckley spoke in more detail about his budding friendship with Mr. Brelaford. He met Mr. Brelaford, a retired school principal, through Mr. Weiss. He was brought in to mentor Mr. Hinckley in photography. Mr. Hinckley went with his brother to purchase a "point and shoot" Nikon digital camera to get started with learning basic photography. They went out for photography excursions and Mr. Brelaford showed Mr. Hinckley how to use computer-editing software to touch up their images. Mr. Brelaford uses "professional printing equipment" and they usually produce 8x10 prints of their work. Mr. Hinckley stressed what a "great guy" Mr. Brelaford is, who is "not getting paid for it."

Mr. Hinckley also commented on how much he has enjoyed exploring music in Williamsburg and the surrounding area. He recalled one occasion when he drove independently to Newport News to meet Ms. Haley at an outdoor venue. He took pleasure in being outside in the summertime, listening to cover bands that were "quite good." He has also been to a few concerts in Merchant Square with Mr. Weiss and Ms. Haley, as well as outdoor festivals on some Sunday afternoons with Ms. Haley. He went to one concert of a band covering Beatles songs, where he found the crowd to be conservative. Mr. Hinckley noted, "It can be boring at times; sometimes I wish I transferred to DC or Newport News, but the transition is to be with my mom."

This led to discussion of Williamsburg being the destination for convalescent leave. Mr. Hinckley remarked that his mother's health is "great" right now. When queried about where he envisions himself living when his mother is no longer able to remain in her home, he responded that he conferred with Mr. Weiss about either staying in the home, or transitioning to a condo or an apartment. Alternatively, as a "Plan B," he would transition back to DC "if need be." He stated his preference, however, to stay in Williamsburg despite there not being as much to do there. Mr. Hinckley wondered if he would be able to attend social events, such as concerts, when traveling to DC for his outpatient appointments. Mr. Hinckley commented:

I'm fine with D.C. and would welcome it. I like D.C. I've been out to D.C. hundreds of times...it would be great with me. But the plan is that I would be living in Williamsburg, not in D.C. I will stay in the home and take care of my mother as much as I can stay there. When the time comes [that his mother cannot continue living in the home], I could stay around the area and continue to take care of her. If I were living her, I would go visit my mother, whenever is ok, if I had a car. It would be disappointing since so much work has been put into Williamsburg at this point. She is doing great now. If we are looking down the road, the plan is to 100% transition to Williamsburg.
